




# This Week's Class Updates

# **Explorers**



We have had a great week in Explorers!

This morning we had a special surprise from Jack Frost, who had frozen some glittery water in the garden! The children all loved exploring the garden hunting for other signs that Jack Frost had been as we talked about why things may have frozen overnight and when they might melt. This afternoon we have been discussing and drawing things that make us happy.

The Explorers have enjoyed listening to the story The Gruffalo this week by Julia Donaldson. We have done a number of activities such as writing the animals names, painting our own Gruffalo and making (and especially eating!) gruffalo crumble! Yesterday afternoon we watched a video of Julia Donaldson

singing the Gruffalo song and learnt some of the makaton actions to go with it!

In maths we have been learning about composition up to 10. In Phonics this week we have learnt the sounds ng, ai, ee and igh. As well as practising the tricky words by, my, me and we. The children have done some great Gruffalo writing and enjoyed some sensory tricky word activities today! They have also enjoyed playing some phonics games on the whiteboard.





# <u>Adventurers</u>

The class had a great week, filled with plenty of learning and fantastic moments of friendship and kindness. It's been lovely to see everyone playing together and instigating fab games at playtime. Oliver was especially keen to play "The tyres are jail" with the year 2 girls at breaktime and was still chatting about it in the afternoon.

In English the class produced detailed maps of Little Red's journey and wrote preposition filled sentences to match. In maths they continued their work on taking away 2-digit numbers in year 2 and word problems and 1-digit problems in year 1.

In Art the children continued to explore Pop Art. In science they drew around their bodies and added labels to their main body parts, I was very impressed by all of their knowledge.

We've sent home a trip letter for March today, hoping to give families a bit longer to plan. Any questions please just ask.

#### **Pioneers**

In maths in Pioneers class this week we have been working on multiplication and division of fractions. The children have been using their understanding in a variety of ways.



In English we have all been allocated a crew member from Shackleton' Endurance crew (pictured above) and have been writing diary entries from their crew member's point of view. The original intention of Shackleton's infamous expedition was to cross the Antarctic continent by sledges, pulled by dogs.

This is a diary entry written by a Pioneer child who is writing from Percy Blackborrow's point of view. At this point the ship (Endurance) and it's crew have just become stuck in sea ice at the Weddell Sea, in January 1915.

### Dear Diary

Today has been exhilarating, the shrieking of the ship has been ear-piercing and the background howling of the wind has been dreadful too. Meanwhile a thick coating of icing like snow has covered the decks. Outside the colour is white, pure white, just on and on for miles it is absurd.

Inside the ship we try not to think about the deathly dangers of the ice trapping us, as we are always hopeful we will escape. In the afternoon Green ordered us to catch fish but I was devastated to have to leave the warmth of "the Ritz." However we do need fresh food, so I had to step out into the bone chilling frost.

Later in the evening, although the temperature was incredibly below freezing we ventured outside again, this time for sledge racing. Beside the Endurance the dog racers (including me) lined up, ready to race. It was close, but Buller and Jerry led me to victory! Silent as mice, all the able seamen stole midnight snacks and we all fell asleep with biscuits in our laps. Percy (the stowaway)
