

## This Week's Class Updates

### **Explorers**

We have had a great week in Explorers!

The children enjoyed their visit from Joanne Ryan on Monday. They challenged her to a race up on the field and found her race videos interesting!

In phonics this week we have started phase 4, we will be about consolidating and improving their knowledge, while introducing trickier words with increased vocabulary.

In maths this week we have been exploring doubling and halving. The children have enjoyed using ladybugs to practise their doubling skills by doubling the ladybugs spots.

We have enjoyed making our own bugs out of egg boxes, the children made bees, ladybugs, spiders and flies. The Explorers have also enjoyed playing 'Beetle' to draw their own beetles to help decorate our home corner. Beetle is a game of rolling dice and drawing a beetle based on the numbers you roll, the first to complete their beetle is the winner!

We have also been talking about the season of spring. The children have enjoyed talking about all the new things you can see when spring comes, including chicks, lambs, green leaves, flowers and butterflies. Today we have taken clipboards up to the woodland area and have been sketching the signs of spring that we could see.

## **Adventurers**

Adventurers were very excited to paint their paper mache whales this week! They were all fully engaged and have done an excellent job. This has been a great hook into our Big Blue Whale text, which has been teaching us lots of exciting facts about blue whales.

In science we did head outside for another hunt, this time for things that are: living, once living and never living. Some items can be tricky to sort; for example grass is living but once picked it no longer is!

Maths has seen us exploring the 2s, 5s and 10s times tables. For year 1 this may be counting in 2s, 5s and 10s; then the year 2s exploring them more as a times tables and looking at the number facts. We just had a fun music session learning about the 'celeste' (see if your child can remember anything about this instrument!) They are hard to come by so we created underwater piece using a triangle and separate bars from a glockenspiel. We changed the dynamics (volume) and decided that the louder the music, the bigger the fish!

We have made a good start on completing the daily mile. At the moment our goal is one lap of the field a day - but ask your child if they were one of the ones who completed more than one lap today; there were some keen beans!

In science we have been classifying vertebrates and invertebrates. This week we have been learning about Viking long boats and made one in art.
