Alba has enjoyed PE. Throwing the vortex and shotput have been practised with many children impressing themselves with their techniques and skills.


In Adventurers Alena has enjoyed working with number lines, William learning about bugs and Luke writing our troublesome creatures.



We hope everyone has a happy and safe half term!






Adventurers


In science we've been learning about natural changes and human changes to the environment then writing and drawing about the impacts.




This week in class we were beginning a new book, post SATS. This book is set in Myanmar (previously Burma) during the Second World War.

Fascinating "Sir Stomp-alot" Facts!



In this report, I am going to tell you lots of interesting facts about elephants, from where they live, to why they are endangered. If this report caught your eye, please read on.

Where do elephants live?

Elephants generally live in Asia and Africa. African elephants normally live in Botswana, Zimbabwe, Tanzania,

Kenya, Namibia, Zambia, and South Africa. Asian Trunkie Mc Trunk Faces mainly live in Sumatra, India, Southeast Asia and Borneo.



Diet: What do elephants eat?

Elephants are herbivores so they eat fruit, grass, and other plants like tree bark (their favourite food!)

How wise are elephants?

Elephants are extremely smart animals because, out of all land animals, they have the biggest brains!

Anatomy:

An elephant's trunk is simply an extension of the nose and the tusks on a dumbo are teeth. You can tell the two different species apart by looking at their ears. African elephants have ears sort of in the shape of Africa and Asian elephants have ears shaped a bit like India.

Why are elephants endangered?

Many African hulks have died due to habitat loss and poaching. Today, less than 50,000 Asian jumbos are left in the wild and 415,000 African tuskers are left.

Elephant families.

Elephants are herd animals and are lead by women. These Trunkinators mourn the death of family members.

A lot of elephant species are extinct like woolly mammoths but there are a few things we can do to prevent the extinction of the remaining species. We can stop killing them for ivory (thankfully,it is illegal to hunt elephants for their ivory tusks.) We can stop habitat loss.

Famous elephants:

The most famous elephant is Jumbo. Other famous elephants are Dumbo, Elma, Bandoola and Babar.

Intelligent Information

They are the largest land animal.

Their trunks have mad skills.

Their tusks are actually teeth.

They have skin that is 2.5cm thick.

Elephants are constantly eating.

They communicate through vibrations.

Outstanding Elephants

Where do Elephants live?



Did you know that there are two different types of elephant species? They are the African species and the Asian species. Commonly, the African elephants live in the African Sahara's, African rainforests and Asian elephants.

Diet: What do Elephants eat?



Generally most elephants eat 149 to 169kg of vegetation daily. Nearly 80% of an elephant's day is spent on eating. Elephants can consume fruit, small plants, tree bark, sticks, grasses, leaves, shrubs, roots and even bushes!

How wise are Elephants?

Have you ever wondered how their social intelligence is so amazing? They hold the ability to recognise and remember other elephants. They are very intelligent, as they often stay in groups. An elephants average IQ is 1.13 to 2.36. Isn't that pretty amazing for an elephant?

Elephant anatomy

Would it surprise you to hear that elephants are mainly known for their distinctive features? Depending on what type of elephant: the Asian's ears are shaped like the country of India and with the African species they are a lot bigger (and shaped like the African continent.) Elephants use their trunks to pick up food and water before placing it into their mouths. They use their tusks as defence, lifting objects and digging. Would it surprise you to hear that elephant's tusks are actually their teeth? Elephant skin is very tough but very sensitive. African elephants live for 60-70 years and the Asian elephants live for exactly 48 years.



Endangered Animals

Unfortunately, they are very endangered, there are only 40,000 to 50,000 left in the wild and you might think it's a lot but really it's very little. It is crucial to find them and take care of them as they play such a vital role in the ecosystem.

Elephant Families: Birth and Death

Like a baby cow you would call it a calf, you would also call a baby elephant a calf too. Adult males are called bulls and females are called cows. Did you know in elephant families females are in charge? Most herds are made up of a range in size from 3 - 25 but sometimes go together in larger groups. When an elephant dies its family strokes the bones with their trunks. It sounds strange and weird but it's true.

Textile Bank

Don't forget that we have a textile bank where you can donate unwanted clothes, belts, paired shoes, bags, hats, (in a tied bag). The donated items will be collected and weighed fortnightly and the school will receive 20p per kilo towards our funds.
