




School Dinner Menu (£3.05 per day or free to Reception, Year 1 & 2 pupils)

This Week's Class Updates



Explorers

We have had a great week in Explorers.

The children have been busy in the role play area acting out lots of different jobs, we've had police, fire fighters, soldiers, vets, delivery drivers and lots of families.

The Explorers enjoyed applying their phonics and art skills to create wanted posters, writing descriptions and drawing their criminal!

We have started our new No Outsiders book this week called 'The Family Book' by Todd Parr. The children enjoyed reading this book and discussing what family means to us. We had a great class discussion about how families can come in all shapes and sizes but they all have some things in common like loving and caring about each other. Each of the children then drew their own family picture to go up on our No Outsiders board.

In maths we have been practising sequencing numbers and recognising patterns and number facts. The children helped to create their own number line together and we discussed how they know which numbers are larger and smaller.

Adventurers

Another week has flown by. Speaking of flown, in DT we have made windmills! See the photos below for our finished products. We have had to follow instructions, bend, cut, attach and test our windmills. The children have enjoyed creating them! They may be repurposed at some point...you will have to wait and see when they bring them home in a couple of weeks' time.

In English we wrote our final piece on polar bears; a poster using all the facts we have learnt in this topic. In maths both year 1 and year 2 have been learning about money. So far we have looked at the value of the coins and the notes. It's getting harder with card and contactless being used so often! If you have any coins at home, let your child spend some time looking at them and see if they can work out amounts or tell you their value.

Next week Mrs Gorman will be re-joining us and I know she is looking forward to getting stuck back in and getting to know the class. I think she is going to be impressed with all their hard work so far this year ©

In English we have been doing instruction writing for our creatures. This week in Maths we have been learning short division, part whole and column multiplication. During art we have been doing flat wash, wet on dry and lifting with watercolours. In PE we have been doing tennis with coach and hand ball with Mr Day. We have been learning about Jewish religions in RE. Finally, in swimming we've been practicing both our front and back strokes.

This week in computing Pioneers have continued with their Al journey. We were learning how Al is able to generate images following a detailed and refined instruction. Here are some examples. We used Microsoft CoPilot. I generated images using my account (as an account with images is not available to the children in school) but the

children picked the information.



Please can you create an image of an anime style, crazy, dog with colossal eyes playing cards with fire reflected in its eyes?



Please can you make an image of a 2023 McLaren Artura that is orange and has a flame coming out of the exhaust, and can it please be on Silverstone F1 track.





Please generate an image of a scary, black cat wearing thick black glasses and an orange puffy ball gown, with rusty shoes.

This week in English we were also creating some descriptive paragraphs about Amazon animals, these were developed in pairs (a Year 5 and a Year 6 child together) not using Al but the children's own writing skills.

Furious Fer-de-lance

A descriptive paragraph about a Fer-de-lance snake, which lives in the Amazon rainforest.

Beware of the nimble, brunette, slinky serpent, slithering through the night. This furious constrictor has an extremely venomous bite. Which could torture a group of minute petrifided creatures. So don't get too close or you shall be deceased in an instant.

He cannot be apprehended for he's been hushed for eternity; writhing through the viridescent greenery. The aroma of this scaly beast is repulsing, while it's left lingering around the leaf-covered understory, where no beam of light has had eyes laid on. Small mammals are no strangers to this long limbless ophidian. Camouflaging itself as a lush liliana, getting ready to pounce on its scampering prey. This horrific predator is found on the brilliant Brazilian terrain, such as the nature guarded Amazon rainforest

Looming Leaf-cutter ants

Be aware of where you step in the damp, dim rainforest, for if you interrupt a vicious leaf-cutter ant's precious territory, instant regret will fall on you. Their only predator, their only enemy, the sharp-clawed diggers known as the one and only armadillo. Don't be fooled by their size, as they can harm you much more than our intelligent human brains realise. We may not be able to hear, but their high-frequency vibrations are used when being harmed. They quietly scuttle all around the gloomy understorey while they hunt for a unique type of fungus. These fatal, miniscule, amber coloured herbivores are as vicious as a snake but 100 times smaller. Beware of these minute beasts. If the rainforest disappears, so do they. Their prey includes; luxurious leaf fragments, fresh flowers (although flowers that are not so fresh are delicious too) and fruit parts.

They live in: South and Central America, Mexico and parts of the Southern United States. Leaf-cutter ants find and gather their food by farming in fungus gardens. As they crawl along the ebony forest floor, they will attack anyone who attempts to harm them.

If you ever travel in the rainforest, be conscious of these copper, menacing critters.

Textile Bank
