






Update

Dear Parents,

In Discoverers the children have been learning about the water cycle whilst in maths they have been calculating area and perimeter.

The water cycle is the continuous movement of water on, above, and below the surface of the Earth, powered by the Sun's energy. It involves evaporation (water turning into vapor), condensation (vapor forming clouds), precipitation (water falling as rain or snow), and collection (water returning to oceans and lakes). This essential process recycles the Earth's water, ensuring its availability for all life.



Meanwhile Pioneers have been writing a story about Jim Jarvis's sisters. In science they have been investigating prisms and the effect rainbows and outside of the classroom they had an opportunity to learn how to preform CPR in an emergency situation.

Adventurers have met Noi in their class text



"Noi" is a character found in multiple children's stories, including Benji Davies' The Storm Whale and Noi Saves the Whale, where he is a compassionate and brave boy who cares for the environment and animals.

In PE they have been honing their football skills and they have enjoyed practising their songs for the harvest festival next week.

In Explorers they have been investigating the local environment, seeing horses on their travels.

In maths they have been making patterns whilst in different areas around their environment, they have been playing the old favourite eye spy.

The game *I Spy* is first recorded in the early 20th century. I spy is a <u>guessing game</u> where one player (the *spy* or *it*) chooses an object within sight and announces to the other players that "I spy

with my little eye something beginning with...", naming the first letter of the object. Other players attempt to guess this object.

This Week's Class Updates



What a great week in Explorers!

This week we have continued to get ready for our harvest assembly next week. The children have been practising their singing and dancing as well as making their own scarecrow hats to wear on the day.

In maths we have been focusing on comparison with the children using the language of comparison to describe sets of objects that they can see. We have been using the stem sentences 'more than' and 'fewer than' to describe what we can see. The children have then expanded on this by comparing odd and even numbers. Noting how they look different visually, for example numicon has an extra square on top if it is odd. We have had some great discussions!

In phonics we have been focusing on rhyming words, playing a number of different phonics games including silly soup. We would sing the rhyme "I'm making lots of silly soup, I'm making soup that's silly. I'm going to cook it in the fridge, To make it nice and chilly. In goes..." and the children would come up with some silly ingredients that rhymed with the sound I chose. Such as "ham, jam and pram" or "bat, cat and hat".

It was lots of fun.

Yesterday we had the school nursing team come in the morning and talk to the children about germs and the importance of hand washing. All the children listened well and shared some great ideas. Nancy, Billie and Eli then demonstrated how easy it is to spread germs using glitter. The children then all practiced the 8 steps of handwashing for 20 seconds (or singing happy birthday twice).

This week we have introduced the Explorers to our 'No Outsiders' book. No Outsiders is a scheme we use across the school which promotes inclusive education, promoting community cohesion to prepare young people and adults for life as global citizens. Each half term we have a different book that has characters that are different but shows that it's ok to be different, you can still be friends with different likes and dislikes. This half term we have been looking at the book 'You Choose' by Nick Sharrat and Pippa Goodhart. We have been discussing

how we may all choose different things and that's ok, we can like different things and still be friends.

This week we have finished our work on The Storm Whale (as shown by our amazing hall display you will all see on parents evening). To keep in line with our under the ocean theme we are now reading through Jonty Gentoo.

In Maths we have been looking at measuring and the children have compared heights, lengths and focused on their presentation when using a ruler.

In other subjects we have been looking at where we are in the world in Geography, linking our continent, country, town work. RE has focused on what is inside a Hindu Mandir. PSHE focused on body language to portray different emotions. There have also been lots of harvest festival rehearsals. A small group of girls have been perfecting their poem and the rest of the class have been practising their song.

We also welcomed a new member of the class. Miss Mcdonald will be joining us until Christmas as part of her training to become a teacher.

In maths we started some work on timetables and devision. And the children impressed me greatly with their rapid recall.

We've written fanatic poems for the assembly on Friday and painted gorgeous watercolour portraits in the style of Giuseppe Archemboldo. With the children filling their own sketched portraits with British seasonal fruits and vegetables.

We've also had a wonderful assembly as part of the Isle of Wight Literacy Festival on Friday morning, where the children were immersed in Greek mythology. Our class had some incredible questions for the author. And left feeling very inspired.
