
















**Update** 

#### Dear Parents,

We have had another good week

One of my highlights was my passing visit to Adventurers on Friday. Logan, during a phonics input on the vowel diagraph 'or' offered an explanation on how winds impact on the seas.

In his own words he said that the combined effect of low air pressure and strong onshore winds (storms) can result in particularly high tides, significantly increasing the risk of coastal flooding.


Well done Logan. That made my morning.

Meanwhile in Explorers, I watched small groups of children during a phonics session. The activity included movement, selecting and naming objects, calculating the number of sounds and learning the term syllables.

The children were very proactive with Reef, Billie, Nancy especially keen to participate. Objects include one word syllables such as car up to words comprising 5 sounds; Arlo even knew the word hippopotamus!!

All the children have been enjoying their continuous provision with many activities both in and out of the classroom.

Adventurers have enjoyed their new class text Storm Whale by Benji Davies.



'Every day, in a house by the sea, a little boy watches his father leave for a long day's work. One night, a great storm washes a small whale onto the beach. The boy discovers the whale is a good listener. The father discovers the boy is lonely. Together, they return the whale to the sea. ...'

They also enjoyed learning compass points with Rowan knowing the four compass points.

The four compass points, also known as the cardinal directions, are North (N), East (E), South (S), and West (W). These points form the fundamental directions used for navigation and on maps, with North always at the top of a map and the magnetic needle of a compass pointing North.

Next test for the parents is to remember the intercardinal points (ordinal).



In Maths, Adventurers have been developing their knowledge of money and using the range of different coins. Eleanor recognised that 5p and £2 and the smallest and largest coins respectively

In Discoverers, we had multiple children sharing all of their fun activities in assembly.

Mabel knew her French colours including blue, rouge and blanc. They enjoyed measuring shapes in maths and learning about Egypt in history.

Raif explained that it was the skilled workforce who made the famous pyramids and not the slaves that is sometimes reported.

A permanent workforce of specialized artisans, masons, and artists, supported by a temporary force of farmers and labourers, constructed the monuments

Art work has also involved Egyptians. In English they have being writing stories and in PE enjoyed the obstacle course.

Pioneers have been learning about the five pillars of Islam. They quoted Shahada which is the declaration of faith and Salah which refers to prayer.

In art they have been sketching.

We have multiple events to look forward to in the coming weeks and months so please keep look out for any messages and texts.

## This Week's Class Updates



### Another busy week in Explorers!

In maths this week we have started looking at repeating patterns. A repeating pattern is a sequence of items that repeats in a predictable order, such as red, blue, red, blue. The children have been learning to recognise, copy, and create these patterns and are able to predict what comes next. We have been using lots of different resources to create our patterns including; conkers and acorns, threading beads, unifix blocks and even a cutting and sticking activity.

In phonics we have been breaking down syllables. They have been developing their listening skills by clapping the "beats" in spoken words. We have had great fun playing different listening games this week. Metal Mike (our class robot) has been enjoying eating different flash cards after the children have used their robot voice to sound out the syllables in different words.

The Explorers have also been very creative this week. We have been using clay and some of the conkers we have collected on our nature walks to make snails. The children have been fantastic at using their fine motor skills to manipulate the clay, rolling, pinching and squeezing to make the snail's body. They all look fantastic!

With Mrs Allman at the beginning of the week the children worked together using our autumn leaves and their handprints to create some autumnal wreaths. These have been used to decorate our school hall.

It's been another busy week in Adventurers. We have continued a lot of our learning from the previous week. In English, we have finished our character profiles for Noi. In Maths we have looked at money and adding total amount of coins.

We have also discussed why a place may be special to us and linked that to our RE work, continued to learn our harvest song and poem in Music and discussed emotions and linked them to colours in PSHE.

### **Discoverers**

This week has definitely seen a transition to autumn. The children have been troopers, battling with potential wet play.

We've finished our fiction stories themed around Egypt and our book Marcy & the Riddle of the Spynx. They were absolutely mind blowing, the level of detail that has gone into the content and description of characters. We will be starting our new book next week...

In maths the children have been figuring out perimeter of shapes, with the end of the week involving quite tricky and complex reasoning problems. We were over the moon with how well the entire class have taken to this unit.

In Art the children have produced detailed side profiles of Egyptian gods and goddesses. Preparing for their next lesson where they will embellish a black and white side profile image of themselves.

In PE the children have been completing circuits inside (with lots of energy) and working on their listening skills.

The children have also had a class attempt at our new spelling programme 'spelling shed'. Which is what we are using as a whole school approach to spelling this year, they will soon be set tasks and games to enforce positive spelling practise via this site to do at home.

In science we have been exploring the nutritional value of food and the question "does high energy food always have high sugar levels?" The children were very surprised by how many G of sugar are in cans of fizzy drinks and snacks.
